125 Year Old Walnut Pound Cake Recipe

(Thanks to Vera Mae Robinson for sharing!)



- ½ lb. butter
- ½ cup shortening
- 3 cups sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- ½ tsp. rum flavoring
- 1 cu[half & half cream
- 3 eggs
- 3 cups plain flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 cup black walnuts (chop fine)

Cream butter, shortening. Add sugar, beat well. Add eggs one at a time; beat well. Add flavoring and beat.

Mix ¼ cup flour with nuts- set aside.

Add remaining flour with baking powder to the mixture, alternating with milk. Start and end with flour. Fold in nuts.

Bake in a large, greased and floured tube pan at 325 degrees for 1 hour and 20 minutes. ENJOY!



A Bit of History of Snow Hill Church By Mark Wright, Historian



In 1959 during the ministry of Reverend W.S. Smith, additional building activity was done at Snow Hill Church. A larger and more modern fellowship hall was completed in 1961. The new fellowship hall included a modern kitchen. The new kitchen had two electric stoves, a refrigerator, and a large counter with storage space. All of the cabinets in the new kitchen were hand built by Mr. Clyde Cole, church member, Part of the floor of the new fellowship hall was a shuffleboard game! The builder was also Mr. Clyde Cole, and the cost was \$29,257.37. The old fellowship hall was converted into Sunday School rooms.

In 1965 during the pastorate of Reverend Donald Ashe, the Cochran Construction Company built the present sanctuary at a cost of \$58,000. The designer was Henry Gaines. The church members who served on the building committee for the expansion were Mr. Clyde Cole (chairman), Mr. C. Floyd Robinson, Miss Modine Hutchinson, Mr. Rhea J. Poore, Mr. Locke Wright, and Mr. George Wright. Along with the new sanctuary the expansion included a pastor's study, a choir room, and two separate stairways that led to the fellowship hall. The seating capacity is three hundred people.

In 1965, the dedication ceremony for the new sanctuary of Snow Hill Church was held. Former Pastor, the Reverend W.S. (William) Smith. delivered the eleven o'clock Sunday morning sermon. The current pastor, the Reverend Donald Ashe, conducted the consecration service, at 7:30 pm that evening in a special evangelistic service that took place with all of the Methodist churches in Hominy Valley represented. The Bishop Earl G. Hunt, Jr., from Charlotte was the special quest minister. Special music was provided by the double otet from Enka High School and accompanied by Miss Myra Wiggins, under the direction of Mr. Jerry Starnes.

In 1965, Snow Hill became a station church with a full time pastor. The first full time pastor was the Reverend Donald Ashe.

When Snow Hill Church was founded in 1877, the deed stated that the church was part of the *Methodist Episcopal Church South.* In 1968, the Methodist Church merged with the *Evangelical United Brethren.* Snow Hill officially became a *United Methodist Church* in 1968. Reverend Bud Ellington was the first pastor at Snow Hill after it became a United Methodist Church.

Homeward Bound: Room in the Inn

I thought our congregation might like to read about what's happening with Room in the Inn (RITI), and if they are so inclined, to send a donation to help keep the program going, since it's not practical at this time for us to host or to deliver meals downtown. We have donated toiletries, clothing, and household goods earlier in 2020, and those are always needed too, but as winter approaches, Homeward Bound could probably use cash donations to meet their needs. As always, I appreciate the willingness of the members of Snow Hill UMC's congregation to reach out to help those in need!

Dear Faith Community Partners,

Room in the Inn (RITI) began 20 years ago out of a sense of urgency to keep women living outside safe, secure, and to help stabilize their lives in housing. Faith communities all over Asheville and Buncombe County stepped up to meet this urgent need. Volunteer coordinators were enlisted who recruited hundreds of volunteers. Faith communities opened their doors to welcome up to 12 women each night of the week, offering a warm bed, a hot meal, compassionate care, and hospitality.

As Homeward Bound began to evolve from just a sheltering agency to one focused on ending homelessness through housing – recognized as the "Housing First" model - these women started moving into permanent homes. Since 2012, when the agency began tracking these moves, we have moved 133 women into their own homes with a new chance to thrive.

Up until March 2020, when COVID moved into our community, RITI continued to provide much-needed sheltering support as these women worked towards housing placement. Understandably, the need to limit congregate settings and reduce exposure to the virus meant that faith communities had to close their facility doors and RITI could

no longer exist as before. In April, the City of Asheville partnered with Homeward Bound and Harrah's Cherokee Center – Asheville to provide shelter for the RITI ladies along with 40 other vulnerable folks who were living outside. We moved several RITI ladies into homes, and the rest moved over to the Red Roof Inn in May when that shelter opened. Each individual in the Inn has their own room with a shower, a warm bed, some have microwaves, and local organizations and faith communities are providing meals and supplies.

To date, all but three RITI ladies have moved into housing, and one has a place to move into shortly. Thirty-one women are sheltering at the Red Roof Inn and other motels throughout the city. Even though shelter for the ladies looks very different now, the hotel shelters maintain the spirit of the Room in the Inn program. They are living inside, safe, secure as they await to move into housing. Discussions are underway with city staff and other providers for the possibility of creating a low barrier shelter if and when the hotel model ends.

The heart of Room in the Inn has always been the faith communities and their volunteers. The need for these resources is just as great now. As we pivot our services to respond to the needs of those experiencing homelessness during this pandemic, volunteer opportunities are listed below and your financial support is always needed and appreciated. We still need your RITI contributions to support our Homeless Services as we continue to provide day services at AHOPE, shelter at various motels, and ultimately work to end their homelessness with housing.

In this season when so many are focused on what they want, the Bible reminds us that we aren't missing any spiritual gifts.

Read: 1 Corinthians 1:3-9
The result is that you aren't missing any spiritual gift while you wait for our Lord Jesus Christ to be revealed. (1
Corinthians 3:7)

For many of us, this first week of <u>Advent</u> is filled with thoughts of *want*. What do the kids want for Christmas? How about our coworkers? And someone has probably

asked you if there is anything you want for Christmas. Do you have an answer?

This season of gift giving and receiving can become stressful. And this year, it seems even more so.
